



Thomas Forrest Kelly is Morton B. Knafel Research Professor of Music at Harvard, where he was named a Harvard College Professor in recognition of his teaching and served as Chair of the Music Department. An internationally recognized authority on medieval and early modern music, and on the performance of music in historical settings, he has lectured widely throughout the U.S. and Europe. Among numerous books and articles for both scholarly and general audiences: Capturing

Music. The Story of Notation (Norton,2014); The Practice of Medieval Music (Ashgate Variorum, 2010); and First Nights: Five Musical Premieres, Yale, 2000). Professor Kelly received his PhD from Harvard, as well as diplomas from the Schola Cantorum in Paris and the Royal Academy of Music in London.



Brandon Straub is Director of Music at St. Paul's Choir School. He has prepared choruses for a growing list of world-class ensembles and conductors, including the National Symphony Orchestra, Boston Symphony Orchestra, Philadelphia Orchestra, and LA Philharmonic at such venues as the Kennedy Center, Tanglewood, Wolf Trap, and the Kimmel Center.

Prior to his appointment at St. Paul's, he served as Director of Choral Music, Chair of Music, and School Organist for the shared music program at St. Albans School and National Cathedral School in Washington, DC. Straub has also led programs at The Hill School and Episcopal High School and served for 11 seasons as Associate Conductor and Pianist for the Choral Arts Society of Washington. While in DC, he was active as a conductor, organist, and professional singer in several churches, including Washington National Cathedral and St. John's Church Lafayette Square (the "Church of the Presidents"). He is also currently the Resident Conductor of the Harvard Glee Club and a rehearsal pianist for the Tanglewood Festival Chorus.

The Saint Paul's Boys Choir

The Saint Paul's Boys Choir, directed by Brandon Straub, is based at the St. Paul's Choir School, founded in 1963 by Dr. Theodore Marier, the only Catholic boys' choir school in the United States. The Boys' Choir sings during term time at daily and Sunday Masses, and at an occasional Choral Vespers. The Choir has toured and performed throughout North America and Europe and made numerous recordings.

SOLOISTS

Scott Metcalfe is the artistic director of the vocal ensemble Blue Heron, winner of numerous accolades. He was music director of New York City's Green Mountain Project for a decade and has been guest director of TENET, the Handel & Haydn Society, the Toronto Consort, and many other ensembles, in music ranging from Machaut to Bach and Handel.

Michael Barrett is a Boston-based conductor, singer, multi-instrumentalist, and teacher. He serves as music director of The Boston Cecilia, a Brookline-based chorus, and is Associate Professor at the Berklee College of Music, where he teaches courses in conducting and European music history. From 2021 until 2023 Michael served as Interim Director of the Five College Early Music Program.

Bass-baritone **Paul Guttry** has performed throughout the USA and internationally with Blue Heron, Sequentia, Chanticleer, the Boston Camerata, and New York's Ensemble for Early Music. A founding member of Blue Heron, he has also appeared in and around Boston as soloist. Paul can be heard on Blue Heron's recordings and on discs of medieval music by Sequentia.

Sumner Thompson is widely regarded as one of the finest interpreters of concert repertoire of his generation, and performs repertoire ranging from medieval to modern, with special emphasis on the musics of J.S. Bach, Benjamin Britten, and Claudio Monteverdi.

He has appeared in North and South America, Europe, and Asia with a number of different orchestras and musical groups, in numerous roles on the operatic stage, and as a bassist and vocalist on recorded albums. He also appears regularly with Singularity, a musicians collective dedicated to the art of improvised live music.

Jason McStoots is a respected interpreter of early music, and has had numerous appearances with BEMF, Bach Collegium Sand Diego, and with the Green Mountain Project NYC. He is a core member of Blue Heron vocal ensemble and has been Associate Director of the BEMF Young Artist Training Program since 2017 He has stage directed operas for Brandeis University, Connecticut Early Music Festival, Amherst Early Music Festival, and Les Délices.
